Student Enrollment

Admissions Procedures

New families should complete the admission application found on the website and then expect an interview with the Directors. New families will be expected to submit information concerning the student's academic history and will be asked to review this handbook.

During the re-enrollment period, returning families can indicate an intention to remain with ETC Phoenix School and be given the opportunity to reserve a spot for the upcoming year prior to general enrollment. A new sibling from a returning family may enroll during the re-enrollment period but must follow the new student application and enrollment process outlined on the school website.

Once you have completed the admissions application, met with the Directors, and paid your tuition, you will receive an acceptance letter.

Tuition and Fees

Since tuition is expected to fund classroom instruction and basic school administration each year, an increase in tuition and fees can be expected each year.

Late Payments

Tuition is due on the first of each month; there is a grace period of two days. A \$50 late fee will be charged PER STUDENT on the 4th day of the month if tuition has not been received on time. An additional \$50 fee per student will be charged for every additional week tuition is late.

Policy for Withdrawal

ETC Phoenix School contracts for its facilities, faculty, and staff on an annualized basis. After an enrollment agreement is signed, parents are responsible to honor the agreement and its designated deadlines and tuition obligations, even if a student withdraws prior to the beginning of the school year.

The application fee and tuition are non-refundable. Once your family has reserved a spot through enrollment and tuition payment, ETC Phoenix School has committed significant administrative planning towards your family. In many cases, we have also denied admission to other families based on class size limits. Your tuition payment confirms your family's commitment to participating in the upcoming year. Exceptions may be made in the case of unforeseen moves out of the geographical region.

A request to withdraw from the school must first be discussed both with the classroom teacher and the Director. After the necessary discussions have taken place, the request must be made in writing (by email or letter) to the Director. Withdrawals made verbally by phone or other forms of communication will not be seen as official notification and, therefore, students will remain fully enrolled until written notification is received and approved. We must be notified at least 30 days prior to the pull out date. This means that families will be responsible for at least one month's tuition once notifying us about withdrawal. Furthermore, any approval to withdraw will be given with the understanding of the financial commitment stated in the signed enrollment agreement.



Academic Information

Curriculum

Charlotte Mason

The Charlotte Mason teaching philosophy is an educational approach developed by British educator Charlotte Mason in the late 19th and early 20th centuries. It emphasizes a holistic and child-centered approach to education, focusing on nurturing a child's mind, heart, and spirit. Here are the key principles of the Charlotte Mason philosophy:

- **1. Education as an Atmosphere:** Mason believed that education occurs not just in formal settings but in the broader environment in which a child grows up. This includes the culture, values, interactions, and experiences that surround them. A rich and nurturing environment is seen as foundational to effective learning.
- **2. Education as a Discipline**: Mason emphasized the importance of forming good habits of mind and character. She believed that discipline is essential for learning and that children should develop habits such as attention, observation, and reflection, which are vital for lifelong learning.
- **3. Education as a Life**: According to Mason, education should be a process that engages the whole person rather than a mere accumulation of facts. This includes cultivating a love of learning and fostering a genuine interest in the world, as well as nurturing moral and spiritual development.
- **4. Living Books:** Mason championed the use of "living books"—well-written, engaging literature that brings subjects to life—rather than dry textbooks. These books should captivate the imagination and encourage critical thinking and personal connection to the material.
- **5. Narration:** One of the cornerstone practices in Mason's philosophy is narration, where students verbally recount what they have learned. This technique encourages comprehension, retention, and the ability to articulate thoughts clearly. Narration can also take many forms, including written summaries or discussions.
- **6. Nature Study:** Mason placed a strong emphasis on nature and the outdoors as essential components of education. She encouraged regular time spent in nature, observation of the environment, and hands-on explorations, promoting both scientific understanding and an appreciation of beauty.



- **7. Art and Music Appreciation:** The philosophy includes a focus on exposure to art and music. Students should engage with original works of art, study composers, and learn to appreciate beauty in various forms.
- **8. Short Lessons**: Mason advocated for short, focused lessons that respect a child's natural attention span, particularly in the early years. This approach helps maintain enthusiasm for learning and allows for deeper engagement with the material.
- **9. Focus on the Whole Child:** Finally, Mason's philosophy is rooted in the belief that education should nurture not just intellectual growth but also emotional, social, and spiritual development. This holistic approach seeks to cultivate a well-rounded individual.

Electives

The ETC Phoenix School curriculum is designed to provide a holistic education that emphasizes academic excellence alongside character development. It integrates subjects such as language arts, math, science, literature, and art while promoting values like kindness, beauty, and moral



integrity. The curriculum encourages creativity, critical thinking, and a love for learning, often incorporating beautiful literature and art into lessons to inspire students and cultivate their appreciation for the world around them.

In addition to the core subjects, ETC Phoenix School offers a range of special elective courses that enhance the learning experience and provide students with valuable skills and opportunities for personal expression. These electives include:

Mason advocated for the use of living books, rather than textbooks, to inspire a love of learning about the natural world, allowing children to explore flora and fauna, ecosystems, and the interrelationships within nature. This immersive, hands-on approach not only enhances scientific understanding but also nurtures emotional and spiritual growth, instilling a lifelong love and reverence for nature.



Classroom Structure

Our classroom structure is flexible depending on registration.

Sparks (Kindergarten) Feathers (1st-2nd) Flames (3rd-4th) Talons (5th-8th)

Monday- Thursday: Students start the day together as a whole school for morning meeting and prayer. Students then go to their individual classrooms for their core subjects. During the blocks students may also be working in small groups or 1:1 instruction as needed. Students have Specials: art, music, PE, and cooking for approximately 45 minutes each day.

Fridays: Fridays will follow a similar but more flexible schedule. This day is utilized to follow up on the week's assignments, provide intervention or extension for those who need it, and to do project-based lessons. This is when we will take our field trips or have special guests come in.

Special Education

At our school, we are committed to providing a nurturing and inclusive environment for all students, including those with special needs. Our staff is highly trained in special education, ensuring that they are equipped to address a range of learning differences and challenges. We maintain small class sizes, which allow for personalized attention and tailored instruction that can be adapted to meet the individual needs of each student. Additionally, our thoughtfully structured curriculum is designed to promote engagement and success for all learners.

General Curriculum Supports

If a student is accessing the general curriculum but requires support, we will work within our structure and support to provide individualized instruction and accommodations. We have special education teachers and additional staff members that can provide push in support or 1:1 or small group pull out support as needed.

Please discuss any needs with the director at registration.

Adaptive Curriculum

For the 2025-2026 school year, we will have a classroom for students who are accessing the adaptive curriculum. Students in this program will be focused on social and life skills while utilizing specialized curriculum programs to meet them where they are. Students will be in class with their grade/age level peers as much as possible but will also receive instruction at their academic levels which may be within the classroom setting or in small group setting. We will work with ABA providers, allowing them to be present throughout the school day to support student needs.

Homeschool

For the 2025-2026 school year we are shifting away from operating as a homeschool and moving toward operating as a private school.

We initially launched as a homeschool group with a swift and enthusiastic approach, and while we will continue to incorporate homeschool curricula and maintain a flexible learning environment tailored to our students' needs, we are transitioning toward operating as a private school.

Why are we making this change? Our goal is to pursue accreditation, which will not only boost our credibility but also unlock additional resources to enhance our educational offerings.

What does this mean for you?

You will no longer need to submit your intent to homeschool or provide proof of progress. Although we will still collect data at the beginning, middle, and end of the year, reporting these scores will not be necessary. This shift allows us to prioritize teaching rather than testing!

We will continue to adhere to Virginia's compulsory attendance laws, provide a comparable curriculum, and maintain necessary records for both students and staff.

Here's a brief overview of the accreditation timeline in Virginia:

Application & Candidacy: Begins with application and acceptance.

Self-Study & Initial Evaluation: Conducted within 2-5 years of achieving candidacy.

Review & Decision: Follows the initial evaluation. Maintaining Accreditation: An ongoing commitment.

Arrival and Dismissal Procedures


Arrival

- Arrival is between 8:55-9:05
- During this time, we will have the back door to the suite open for students to enter. A
 staff member will be standing by the door to greet students. It is up to parents if they
 want to park and walk students in or drop them off at the front door.
- Parents are not permitted to enter without an appointment. (We love you and want to talk
 to you but mornings can be hectic and set the tone for the rest of the day. We would love
 your help in keeping the safety and integrity of the start of the school day. Thank you.)
- If you arrive after 9:05, the doors will be locked. Please enter the waiting room (front entrance) and ring the bell.

Dismissal

- Dismissal is at 3:00.
- Students staying for extended care will be dismissed from class to extended care at 3:00
- At 3:00 we will bring everyone outside and dismiss as a kiss and ride line. Please follow
 the arrows in the diagram below allowing you to pull up to the sidewalk where we will
 have everyone enter their cars.
- At 3:05 (after the kiss and ride line) we will take any remaining kids inside for aftercare.





*As we grow we may need to shift this procedure but will communicate any changes.

Attendance

We will be tracking attendance and are required to report any truancy concerns. Please let us know if your child will be late, picked up early, etc.

Assessments and Grading

Parents are asked to remember that grades are only one indication of how much a student is learning and only one aspect of student abilities. Parents are also encouraged to remind their students that their sense of worth does not come from grades, but from their status as children made in God's image they should be proud of doing their best and working hard regardless of the specific grade earned in any given subject.

That said, objective standards exist for subjects.



At-Home Work Days for 3 and 4 day students

It is necessary for the parent to oversee and monitor the at-home work component to ensure that students are understanding the content and learning to their fullest potential.

The amount of time for doing work on any given home day will vary from day to day and from student to student. Some students will always require more time; others will require less time. The generic rule of thumb is that the workload ought to take one hour more than the grade level.

However, the amount of time for doing work on any given home day will vary from day to day and from student to student. Some students will always require more time; others will require less time. The younger grades will require fewer hours than the upper grades. If you are concerned about the amount of time your child is spending to finish their work on home days, whether too little or too much, please email your teacher.

There will be NO at-home work assigned on the Federal Monday holidays, Veterans' Day, or over the Thanksgiving, Christmas, or Easter breaks.

Homework

We understand that the topic of homework can be a concern for many families, and we want to take a moment to explain our decision to adopt a no-homework policy at our school. Our primary goal is to foster a love of learning and to ensure that our students have ample opportunities to explore their interests, spend time with family, and engage in activities outside of the classroom. By eliminating homework, we aim to reduce stress and pressure on students, allowing them to focus on deepening their understanding of classroom material during school hours. We believe that learning is best achieved through exploration, discussion, and hands-on experiences, rather than through assignments that may not always enhance understanding or retention. That being said, we may send home notes or spelling words for students to study or optional extra practice but we do not require that work be done at home (outside of the 3 and 4 day homeschool student's regular school work) We encourage you to discuss what your child is learning each day and to engage in educational experiences together at home. Thank you for your understanding and support as we strive to create an enriching environment for all students.

Report Cards

Reports are issued at the end of each quarter. Students will receive marks for academic work, as well as marks for work habits and behavior. Teachers are required to notify both parents in writing before the end of each grading period if a student is in danger of receiving a failing academic grade for the quarter.

Academic Integrity

Essential to the success of ETC Phoenix School is a commitment to the principles of academic integrity, which derive from God's law as encapsulated in the Ten Commandments and summarized by Jesus' commands to love the Lord and to love others. Activities that have the



effect or intention of interfering with the education or fair evaluation of any student's performance are prohibited and will invite immediate disciplinary action on behalf of the Head of School.

Examples of such activities include but are not limited to the following:

- Cheating—using or attempting to use unauthorized assistance, material, or study aids in examinations or other academic work. Example: using a cheat sheet in a quiz or exam, altering a graded exam and resubmitting it for a better grade, using another student's or sibling's previous tests to study for current tests.
- Plagiarism—using the ideas or language of another person without specific or proper acknowledgment. Example: copying another person's work (regardless of source) and submitting it for an assignment, cloning someone else's ideas without attribution, failing to use quotation marks where appropriate.
- Facilitating academic dishonesty—knowingly helping or attempting to help another person violate any provision of these principles. Example: working together on a takehome exam.
 - This includes cheating on tests and quizzes, plagiarism, unauthorized use of Al generated content, and giving or receiving improper assistance on homework. In the case of cheating or plagiarism or unauthorized use of Al generated content, an additional academic punishment of a zero grade may be given for the cheating incident at the discretion of the Director.
- Unfair advantage—attempting to gain unauthorized advantage over fellow students in an
 academic exercise. Example: gaining or providing unauthorized access to examination
 materials, obstructing or interfering with another student's efforts in an academic
 exercise misrepresenting the need for an extension for an assignment, exam, paper, etc.

If a parent/student is unsure whether an action constitutes a violation of these principles, then it is that parent's/student's responsibility to consult with the instructor to clarify any ambiguities. In these matters, our goal should be to honor God and promote His glory.

Textbooks and Supplies

Most necessary textbooks and consumable texts are purchased by ETC Phoenix School staff and paid for via the annual deposit. Families are responsible for providing such classroom supplies (pencils, markers, notebooks, etc.) as noted by each teacher.

Students are expected to attend all outdoor recesses unless there is a medical reason that restricts the students' involvement outdoors. Whether as players or spectators, ETC Phoenix School students are expected to:

- Never make disparaging remarks about opposing teammates, classmates or players. Always follow game rules.
- Never attempt to injure anybody.
- Accept responsibility (and consequences) for mistakes.
- Practice safety and follow all instructions by the teacher on duty.

We currently use the Providence Elementary School baseball field and nearby playground for recess time. Students wear safety vests and are accompanied by an adult at all times.

Lunch/Snack

- Students are required to bring a packed lunch from home.
- Snack times are also given during the day.
- We suggest that students bring a refillable spill-proof water bottle to school every day.
- Due to potential food allergies, students are not permitted to share food.
- Lunches and snacks must be peanut-free due to allergies.
- Students are not allowed to chew gum on campus.
- There will usually be no provision at the school to supplement or purchase lunches if forgotten at home.



In-Class Celebrations

If you wish to send in food to celebrate your child's birthday please coordinate with the classroom teacher first and make sure that any food brought in is peanut free and that you and the teacher communicate on any other classroom allergies.

Phones and Electronic Devices

Please do not bring electronics of any kind to school.

Because cell phones distract from the human interactions that we value, students are not permitted to bring electronic devices on campus. Any approved devices must remain in the Director's office. Parents are asked to communicate with their children through the school office/Director during the school day.

Smart watches must be in student/do not disturb mode during school hours. Photography and audio or video recording on the smart watches is prohibited without explicit consent for student safety. If watches become a distraction, it is up to the discretion of the teachers to no longer allow the watches. If a watch becomes an issue, the teachers will notify the parent.

Discipline Procedures

"I have no greater joy than to hear that my children are walking in the truth."

3 John 1:4



The goal of all discipline measures at ETC Phoenix School is to train students to know the joy of obeying God. Our role is to come alongside parents with delegated authority in effort to uphold God's standard of living and behaving towards others.

Because of our unique vision, mission, and community, students, parents, faculty, and staff at ETC Phoenix School are expected to function in Christian charity. When concerns arise, the principles found in Scripture, especially in Matthew 18 are to be followed by everyone involved.

Difficult situations are compounded when they are shared among people who are not part of the solution. Self-examination of motives and attitudes should precede attempts to correct a problem. A spirit of gentleness is expected when approaching people with concerns.

If your brother sins against you, go and show him his fault, just between the two of you. If he listens to you, you have won your brother over. But if he will not listen, take one or two others along, so that every matter may be established by the testimony of two or three witnesses.

Matthew 18:15-17

Issues with other parents

If you have a conflict with another parent, please remember that all families are coming to ETC Phoenix School with different backgrounds and experiences. If you hear or see another parent say or do something that is in conflict with the way you would handle the situation, pray first then contact the parent privately as soon as possible to discuss your concern. Often minor misunderstandings can be solved through effective communication.

If you meet with a parent but are unsuccessful in resolving the situation, please contact the Head of School.

If you have a concern about another child in the class, please speak to the teacher rather than the parent of the other child.

Issues with teachers

If you have a concern about your child in the classroom, please contact the teacher directly to discuss your concern. Classroom issues including grades, class work, homework, class rules, daily routines, and conflict between your child and another student. If you are unsuccessful in resolving the situation by speaking with the teacher, please contact the Director. The Director will not discuss a student issue that has not first been addressed with the teacher.

If you have a complaint:

- Pray about it. Ask God to help you make your complaint in such a way that it will result in the betterment of our school, and thus is the glory and growth of His Kingdom.
- Express it promptly. Keeping it to yourself can cause ill feelings and friction which may cause worse problems later.
- Tell it to the right person. Complaints against specific individuals should be expressed fit to the individual in question, then through the chain of command (teacher, Academic Dean, Head of School) if you cannot work it out with the primary individual.



- Express it clearly. Make sure the person you are expressing your complaint to knows all
 the details of the situation, and exactly what you are complaining about and why.
 Misunderstanding of complaints could lead to further problems, and needless disunity.
- Don't broadcast it. Express your complaint only to the person who should hear it.
 Unneeded worry, harm, and hard feelings result when problems and dissatisfaction are expressed to persons other than those directly involved with the problem, and an impression of disharmony is presented.

Standards of Conduct

It is vital for parents and students to realize that maintaining an orderly atmosphere in the school and the classroom is critical to the learning process and, more importantly, it is reflective of the principles of Scripture. Therefore, ETC Phoenix School has established high standards for student conduct.

ETC Phoenix School views the school as an extension of the home in the training and nurturing of its students. In light of this fact parents are asked to:

- Cultivate courteous behavior of their children in thoughts, words, actions, and attitudes.
- Cultivate habits of punctuality, thoughtfulness, neatness, honesty, resourcefulness, independent reading, and study.
- Expect students to participate in all school activities to develop social skills and friendships.
- Require completion of all at-home work, making certain that all books and completed work are returned to school the following day.

In addition, students should:

- Practice patience by raising hands in class when wishing to speak.
- Practice self-control by walking calmly and quietly.
- Treat others with honor by exhibiting appropriate eye contact.
- In the case of boys, practice being gentlemen by opening doors and offering their chair to ladies and girls.
- Show honor toward all positions and symbols of authority at school and at home, including parents, teachers, God and His Word, and government leaders.
- Show respect, good judgment and propriety toward members of the opposite sex. No displays of affection (physical or otherwise) are permitted on campus
- Dress and use restrooms in accordance with their biological sex.
- Value and safeguard the property of other students.
- Refrain from profanity, obscenity, cheating, lying, stealing, smoking, and the use of drugs or alcohol.
- Refrain from buying, selling or trading while at school without written permission.
- Refrain from using electronic games or equipment, including cell phones and smart watches, at school or on school-related functions and trips. Students found with such equipment will be required to leave it with their teacher.
- Never bring guns, knives, or weapons of any kind to school or to any school function or trip.



Student Discipline

The School views discipline as a branch of learning rather than simply a list of rules. Children are taught behavior management and self-regulation. Classroom rules are agreed upon at the beginning of each year. These rules stress the importance of creating a classroom in which learning can take place and the importance of respecting the rights, feelings and property of all. Our goal is to maintain a secure, challenging and nurturing school environment in which students develop a strong sense of integrity and respect for others. In order to promote this goal, students are expected to be honest, use appropriate language, and have appropriate interactions with others.

Another equally important goal is to help students mature and learn a sense of self responsibility. For this reason, students are held to a high standard of integrity and are expected to appropriately seek help and report problems when circumstances arise. We encourage students to seek help and report problems on their own without parental involvement as much as possible.

The standards of student conduct are designed to provide students with guidance to help them meet the goals and expectations of our community. Our behavioral expectations should be read carefully. Violations will result in serious consequences, up to and including suspension or dismissal from the School. Students may also be held responsible for any damage or harm that they cause to individuals and/or the School community at large.

Our policies and expectations apply any time a student is enrolled in the School, whether on or off campus, including school breaks.

The policies and expectations outlined in this Handbook should not be read as an all inclusive description of the School's standards, which are based on **honesty**, **respect**, **trust and safety**. Any behavior that constitutes a breach of these School values may be treated as a major infraction. Students may be dismissed or otherwise disciplined if the student does not meet the behavioral or academic standards of the School, or whose conduct at any time or place interferes with School programs or operations, or brings discredit to the School. Determination of compliance is in the sole discretion of the School.

Student Behavioral Expectations

- Students are expected to be considerate and respectful of adults, visitors, and one another at all times.
- Students are required to show good sportsmanship and courtesy at all times on and off campus.
- Students are expected to cooperate with School staff at all times.
- Students are expected to listen and respond appropriately.
- Students are expected to respect school property and the property of others.
- Students are expected to respect other children and to listen to their wishes regarding personal space, personal belongings, etc.
- Students are expected to settle their own problems whenever appropriate.



- Students are expected to follow classroom rules.
- Students are expected to be honest.
- Students are expected to treat others with kindness and respect.
- Students are expected to use appropriate language and actions.
- Students are expected to refrain from fighting and horseplay.
- Students are expected to refrain from bullying, harassing, or intimidating peers at all times.

Classroom Approach

- Class rules: these are simple, discussed and posted in each classroom
- "Environmental" handling of problems: change seating, change in classroom activity, etc.
- Directly and privately talk with a student: "What can we do about the talking during math class?"
- Behavior modification: incentives to encourage appropriate behavior such as earning points or tickets that can be exchanged for activities or privileges, etc.
- Isolating a student: any student who continually interferes with the learning of others may be asked to take his/her work to another area of the School to finish. If this is a regular occurrence, this situation will be discussed with the parents.
- Finding another school placement: if we are unable to keep a student from disrupting others, we will meet with the parents and help them find a more appropriate school setting for their child.
- The School reserves the right at all times in its discretion to issue discipline, up to and including removal from School.

Procedures and Consequences

The teacher of each class is in charge of the ordinary discipline in the classroom. The student is expected to comply with whatever rules or disciplinary measures the teacher may impose. Faculty and staff members should always be addressed in a polite and respectful manner. Confrontational behavior with a teacher is at variance with conduct expected from all students and parents. Each situation will be handled at the School's discretion in accordance with the School's rules, policies, and practices as well as general common sense. Students who do not behave appropriately or break the rules will experience consequences that are developmentally and situationally appropriate, such as talking with a member of the administration and/or potentially being sent home from School. Any continued violation of these expectations will result in a conference with the child's parents, teachers and administrative staff, as well as with the child. Disciplinary incidents will be considered over the entire time a student is enrolled at the School. However, there may be one incident or infraction that could lead to suspension or removal from School.

Bullying and Harassment

The physical and emotional safety of each student is the primary concern of the administration, faculty and staff of our School. To encourage positive social interactions, the teachers work closely with each class to encourage the courtesy, respect and kindness essential to a



supportive and nurturing academic environment. Any behavior, either in person or with the use of technology, including but not limited to intimidation and/or harassment, which threatens the emotional or physical safety of any of our students will not be tolerated. This includes but is not limited to teasing, ridiculing, threatening, and inappropriate touching. We are confident that we have our parents' full cooperation and assistance in expecting from our students only those behaviors which affirm the highest ideals of good citizenship and healthy peer relationships.

All concerns relating to harassment or bullying should be reported immediately to the Principal. We also expect that anyone, whether student, faculty, staff or family member who witnesses, or has knowledge of an incident of bullying or harassment, will report the incident to administration immediately. When the School administration becomes aware of harassment or bullying, the situation will be promptly investigated. Any student found to have violated this policy will be subject to disciplinary action, including dismissal from School for serious violations. No adverse action will be taken against any person who makes a good faith report of harassment or bullying. Retaliation in any form against anyone for making a complaint under this policy or for participating in an investigation is strictly prohibited. Any retaliation should also be reported pursuant to this policy and is itself a cause for disciplinary action.

Cell Phones and Other Electronics

When a student brings any electronic devices to School (smart/cell phones, iPads, Gameboys, etc.), the student does so at his/her own risk. The School will not be responsible for the theft, damage, or loss of such devices. Students who choose to bring such devices to school must comply with all rules and regulations regarding the same.

All electronic devices must be turned off and stored in the student's backpack while on campus unless a teacher has specifically authorized the use of the device during that particular class for educational purposes. If the device is being used for educational purposes, students must comply with the guidelines relating to such use. Whenever such use is permitted, students may not use electronic devices in any way that is harassing or disruptive to the educational environment including using devices to take, transmit, or post pictures or videotape classes, to send text messages to other students in class, or in ways that would otherwise violate a School rule. Students who violate this policy will have their cell phones or electronics confiscated. In such case, the School reserves the right to inspect the device, including all contents.

Students must provide any passwords to inspect the device upon request by a School administrator. Parents will be required to come to the School office to pick up confiscated items. Students will also be subject to disciplinary procedures for violation of this policy.

Drugs and Alcohol

General: Students are prohibited from possessing, using, selling or purchasing any
alcoholic beverages or other mind-altering substances (including synthetic salts or other
substances) on or near School property or at School-related off campus activities.
 Off-premises possession, use, sale or purchase of mind-altering substances and
off-premise alcohol abuse is also prohibited. This policy does not prohibit the proper



- use of medication under the direction of a physician. However, the misuse or abuse of such drugs is prohibited. Parents of students who are taking prescription or nonprescription drugs must notify an administrator in the School Office of this fact when they report to School. All medications should be dropped off at the Front Office or given to the School Nurse by the parent, not by the student or in the student's book bag.
- Consequences: The School reserves the right to impose additional or different requirements as appropriate for the circumstances: determination of possible legal action; required professional counseling approved by the administration; required random and/or regularly scheduled drug and/or alcohol testing at a School-approved local clinic or doctor's office for a time period and at intervals to be determined by the School's administration. Refusal of a student (directly or through a parent/guardian) to undergo testing or to cooperate fully with any of these tests is considered a positive test result and will result in automatic expulsion.

Tobacco Products

The use or possession of tobacco products is not permitted on campus or at School related events.

Safety

Bathroom Procedures

In this location, separate male and female restrooms are located in the main hallway on the floor outside of our suite.

- We will have regularly scheduled bathroom breaks throughout the day where the class will go together.
- Students needing to use the restroom outside of scheduled breaks MUST be accompanied by an ETC Phoenix School adult.
- Students must be prepped on bathroom procedures on the first day:
 - Must be accompanied by an adult
 - o One student in a stall at a time
 - Wait until restrooms are clear of other users
 - o Go, wash, get out- no playing

Safety Drills

ETC Phoenix School will conduct fire drills twice during the year. Students and staff will meet at a predetermined location and roll be taken.

School Closings

In the event of a school closing due to inclement weather, cancellations will be announced via



email and posted on our facebook page. ETC Phoenix School will make every effort to have school as long as the safety of our students is not in jeopardy and the parking lot is accessible. ETC Phoenix School will follow the guidelines of FCPS school closings but will monitor our facility and surrounding routes and may make a different decision.

Reporting of Child Abuse

We take our responsibilities to report suspected physical abuse, emotional abuse, emotional deprivation, physical neglect, inadequate supervision, sexual abuse or exploitation seriously and will cooperate with governmental authorities in connection with their investigations. If you have any questions regarding the School's mandatory reporting obligations, please consult with the Principal.

Medical

Illness and Accidents

It is expected that students are sent to school healthy, well rested, and ready for class. Students with a temperature of 100 degrees Fahrenheit or greater, diarrhea, contagious viruses, severe colds, vomiting, and the like will be sent home to avoid infecting others. Students should be fever and symptom free (below 99.5) without medication for at least 24 hours before returning to school. Students who are lethargic, tired, and unable to do their schoolwork will be sent home for rest and recuperation.

The teacher will determine if a child who becomes ill or is injured needs to be sent home. Staff will call a parent to inform them of their child's condition.

For a serious illness or accident requiring a trip to the hospital, parents or guardians will be notified immediately. A school staff member or volunteer parent will accompany the child to Hospital.

If an antibiotic is prescribed, the child must complete 24 hours of therapy before he / she may return to school.

Parents should provide the school with emergency numbers of friends and/or family who can pick up their child from school. A parent is required to have their child picked up within 30 minutes of receiving a call from the school office. Sick children cannot remain at school past th period of time. If parents are not reached within a timely manner, the emergency contact will be called to pick up the child.

Medications

If your student has a severe allergy (anaphylaxis), asthma, diabetes, or a potentially life-



threatening medical condition, fill out the appropriate form and return the form to the Director.

Please notify the Director if your student has a health-related need during the school day or if your student has any serious medical conditions.

ETC Phoenix School teachers will administer medications such as pain medication and allergy medicine, if a parent provides a signed note indicating dosage amount and timing. In case of a need that arises during the day, parents may give permission for medication via phone or text.

Injury Reporting

If a child is hurt during the class day, parents will be notified via email and / or text and if necessary, you will receive a call from the teacher or Director. In the event of a serious issue, 911 will be called.
